Hand to Hand

The Hand to Hand Program is a homework assistance/tutoring program based at the Douglass Community Center. It is financed by the Douglass Center through the city of Manhattan's Parks and Recreation Department. Marianne Cullers, a retired math teacher, is the volunteer director of the program. The program serves students grades K-12 at no cost and is located at the Douglass Center Annex at 901 Yuma St. with parking in the rear. Transportation is not provided. Retired teachers, KSU students, and community members volunteer as tutors and supervisors. Tutors provide one-to-one assistance with homework and use computer activities, work sheets, and educational games to provide help on needed skills. A retired teacher supervises each session. A reading and a math program with limited enrollment are offered in July.
